HOUNSLOW ARTS TRUST TAKES DECISION TO CLOSE WATERMANS AHEAD OF ITS FUTURE MOVE TO NEW BUILDING.

Hounslow Arts Trust Ltd, the charity that operates Watermans, west London's leading arts centre, has announced the venue will close on 11 April as part of the transition period ahead of its planned move to a new building, providing a much-needed upgrade for the operation and enjoyment of the mixed programme.

The charity has taken the difficult decision to close Watermans as the best possible way of protecting both the interests of Hounslow residents and the organisation's financial viability ahead of its relocation to the site of the old police station building in Brentford.

In the context of a challenging recovery period following the pandemic, the impact of energy price rises and the on-going costs of maintenance for the current venue, it makes operational and financial sense to focus on the delivery of outdoor events at **Bell Square**, **Creative People and Places Hounslow** activities and other community-based programmes which do not require use of the current building. Each of these activities are fundamental to maintaining access to culture for Hounslow's residents and Hounslow Arts Trust will continue to work with its stakeholders to ensure that the CPP programme and outdoor events programme continues.

In 2023, Bell Square events reached a multi-generational and wholly diverse audience of 34,757 residents and visitors.

During 2023-24, Creative People and Places Hounslow programmes engaged with 135,000 residents.

All programmed events and activities at the Watermans building will stop. Hounslow Arts Trust Ltd. will continue to exist but with a focus on delivering a programme outside Watermans during the transition period and continue to work to enable this programme to continue.

Hounslow Arts Trust is extremely proud of the programmes that have been delivered with communities at Watermans for nearly forty years and would like to thank its incredible team of current and past staff at Watermans who made the venue such a welcoming community space for so many people, as well as the audiences, funders and artists who supported it over those years. The charity is grateful to its principal funders, Arts Council England and





London Borough of Hounslow who have supported the organisation throughout the development of the transition plan.

Director of Watermans, Jan Lennox adds:

"Watermans has been home to the very best cinema, theatre, music, dance and performance for nearly forty years and it is heart-breaking that the venue is closing before the new building is ready. However, we are working hard to continue to deliver our exciting programmes outside of the current building and to continue to plan for when the new building is ready. A new building that will be more sustainable operationally and able to present an even stronger mix of high-quality dance, theatre, music, film and exhibitions."

A Hounslow Council spokesperson said:

"As a council we're committed to supporting a rich cultural offer for the borough, recognising the many benefits arts and culture provide for our diverse communities. Watermans plays an important role in delivering our ambitions for culture and we're pleased it will remain able to offer the community-based programmes residents really value. The cost-of-living crisis is putting enormous pressure on cultural venues across the country, and we support Hounslow Arts Trust taking the steps necessary to become sustainable."
