

PUBLIC STATEMENT

ARTS CENTRE BUILDING AFFECTED BY FIRE

Watermans, confirms that London Fire Brigade were called to a fire at the arts centre building earlier today.

The fire, which has badly affected the venue's smallest studio space, appears to have been started accidentally, involving a third party outside the building. According to the London Fire Brigade investigating team the fire then spread inside. The fire damage was contained within the studio space. However, water damage has affected the restaurant area below the studio space. No-one was inside the building at the time and there were no injuries.

CPP Hounslow is part of Arts Council England's national investment in engaging new audiences in the arts, in areas where there is little or no access to arts and culture. Watermans leads the Creative People and Places consortium in Hounslow.
